MRSA is one of the bacteria listed by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as a " superbug " resistant to multiple antibiotics. MRSA skin infections can be picked up either in the general community (community-associated MRSA or CA- MRSA infection) or in health care facilities (health care-acquired or HA-MRSA).
